**Communication**—Every Monday we will send home via email our school's newsletter – the Cromehurst News. Please take the time to read the school newsletter to keep you informed of the exciting activities and learning occurring at Cromehurst and to remind you of the important events coming up during the term.

We use <u>School Bytes</u> (who now also have an app) for correspondence, attendance, online payments and forms. If you need help setting up your School Bytes parent portal or app, please contact the office who can send through instructions and help you get started. It is a very important way for the school to communicate with parents.

If you need to share something related to your child's school day, please communicate directly with the office, as teachers may not be able to check emails during class. The office will pass the message on. **P&C**— Our school has a lovely parent body (the P&C). It is a very small group and they will be looking for more parents to join them this year. They meet just once a term, and it is an opportunity for parents to connect socially and to contribute to discussions about our school. Please contact the school if you would like to be involved in the P&C and we will pass your details onto our President.

Attendance—Classes at Cromehurst School start at 9am and finish at 2.45pm. Please make sure you arrive between 8.45am and 9am so that students are ready to start class on time. It is less disruptive for your child, and helps your child settle in well to their school routine if they can arrive before the bell. It is also less disruptive to your child's class. If you are collecting your child from school, they need to be collected each day between 2.45pm and 3pm. Please do not arrive after 3pm as your child can get very upset when they are the only one left at school. If you would like permission for your child to attend therapy during school hours, please send an email to school requesting a change in school times.

Finally, if your child is sick, please use your School Bytes parent portal or app to complete an absentee notification. Alternatively, you can email or call the school to advise the reason that your child will be absent from school that day. All unexplained absences will be followed up by the office if we have not heard from you as to why your child is not at school.

Attendance matters! Attendance is compulsory at all public schools and we hope to see your children at school every day, unless they are sick.

### External providers/therapists:

If you would like a therapist to come in for weekly school visits with your child, please fill out a Parent Therapy Request Form (which can be found on School Bytes). Later in this newsletter there is a flowchart that we follow for all visiting external providers. Once the request form is submitted, our Learning Support Team will review/approve the request, the therapist will be screened, then the teacher will contact the therapist to discuss the service provided and organise a time for the therapy to occur at school. Please note that it is the parent's responsibility to let the therapist know if your child is sick and will not be at school on that day, if your child goes home sick from school/picked up early or if therapy is unable to occur due to a school event/excursion.

**Literacy/Curriculum** —This year, Dawn has stepped into the role of our new literacy teacher. She is excited to be working with the teachers and students across the school on the new English syllabus and on embedding the Passport for Learning assessment into class programs to enhance our students learning. We will provide more information on Dawn's exciting new teaching role at the information night and at the first P&C meeting.

**School Behaviour Support and Management Plan—**The School Behaviour Support and Management Plan outlines how we encourage positive behaviour and address inappropriate behaviour at our school. Here are the main points:

- Behaviour Expectations: Clear guidelines on acceptable and unacceptable behaviours.
- **Support Strategies:** Approaches to encourage good behaviour, including rewards for positive actions.
- **Intervention Procedures:** Steps to take when students don't meet expectations, including consequences and support.
- Roles and Responsibilities: The roles of teachers, staff, students, and parents in fostering a positive school environment and addressing behaviour concerns.
- Communication: How the plan will be shared and feedback collected from all involved.
- **Monitoring and Review:** How we will track the plan's effectiveness and make necessary adjustments.

The plan is available on the school website so that all parents and carers can easily access it. This allows you to see our approach and stay informed on how we support their child's behaviour and development.

### The Cromehurst Cottage

The Cromehurst Foundation is a registered charity providing essential facilities, resources and programs for children and adults with an intellectual disability who attend or have previously attended Cromehurst School.

One of the essential facilities is an independent living skills program conducted in The Cromehurst Cottage in Tryon Road, Lindfield (next to the school). Past and present students of Cromehurst School live in during the week and learn many of the skills essential for daily living, such as cooking, cleaning, shopping and personal care as a complement to their school programs. This program provides a much-needed resource for children and adults with intellectual disabilities.


Eligible students are able to go to the Cottage straight from school, have an afternoon tea or dinner and can also stay overnight. When staying overnight, the Cottage Co-ordinator will walk the student to school the next morning. The Cottage allows our students to practise social skills and life skills. # Compulsory school attendance

### Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

# What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

# The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

# What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- · being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

### NSW Department of Education

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

#### Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

# My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

# What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

### What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

### Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.
